Bird Moms

A new generation of birds will soon be entering the world and the food and housing we provide can make a significant difference on how well they will thrive and survive in our own backyards.

Recent research studies have shown that bird moms with access to bird feeders will often lay their eggs earlier

than those without feeders. This is significant because earlier broods typically have better rates of survival and fledging success than later ones.

Feeders also allow breeding birds to spend less time searching for food and more time selecting better nesting sites and constructing higher quality nests. The adults will also have more time available for protecting their nest, eggs and young from predators.

When abundant, quality food is accessible to parent birds it means that more food is provided to their chicks. Studies have shown that this extra nutrition reduces aggression among nest siblings and increases their rate of growth.

But food is not the only key in helping birds to nest successfully in your yard. A properly designed and installed nesting box can make a significant improvement in nesting success, especially during extreme periods of cold and damp weather.

May High Desert Bird-ofthe-Month:

American Robin

AS AMERICAN AS APPLE PIE

In colder climes in the Midwest and East, the return of the Robin is one of the first harbingers of spring. Although some Robins do migrate to warmer areas in winter, a good

portion of our area's population are year-round residents. While Robins are common town and city birds, they are equally at home in mountain forests and the Alaskan wilderness.

Robins are the largest members of the thrush family. Take notice of the robin's upright posture with tail down and beak pointed upward; this is the basic shape of

most thrushes. They are graybrown with warm orange underparts and a dark head. Females have a paler head with less contrast to the gray back.

Spring through fall you are most likely to see American Robins foraging on grassy areas, looking for earthworms. When foraging they will run a few steps, stop abruptly to stare at the ground with head cocked to the side. It was once thought they were listening for worm



movement; we now know they are listening to hear the worms underground. It is great entertainment to watch them tug and tug to pull an earthworm out, and then see how incredibly quick they are to devour it. Robins tend to eat more earthworms in the morning and more fruits later in the day. Because they spend so much time on lawns, they are very susceptible to pesticide poisoning.

May Nature Happenings

- * Big Brown Bats might be seen swooping at dusk to eat flying insects.
- * Dawn Chorus: It's a most delightful avian chorus as males sing their finest to start the nesting cycle.
- * Hummingbirds arrive. Be sure to have their feeders up early in the month.

- * Chokecherry, Serviceberry, Cottonwood are in bloom early in the month.
- * Peak of warbler migration happens early in month.
- * Nesting materials are being collected.
- * Bullock's Orioles return and begin nesting. Be sure to have their feeders, nectar, fruit and jelly out early.
- * Black-headed Grosbeaks return.
- * Be on the lookout for tadpoles in ponds.
- * Eta Aquarids meteor shower is early-May.
- * International Migratory Bird Day is mid-May.

Local Bird Sightings by Jacque Lowery

May is here, hurray! It is now officially time to hang hummingbird feeders and watch for the smallest, feistiest, most entertaining birds you are likely to ever see in your yard. Be sure to increase your chances of successfully attracting hummingbirds by including hummingbird-friendly plantings.



Penstemon, rose of Sharon, trumpet vine, bee balm, agastache and honeysuckle are just a few plants that are

hummingbird approved; even a pot of red petunias near a feeder can help these little dynamos find your feeder for the first time.

May is also the peak bird migration month. This is a good time to make sure the feeders (seed, suet, peanut, seed cylinder) are well stocked and that the birdbath is cleaned and filled regularly. Some migrating birds, depending on species, may make long



migrations without stopping much to refuel along the way. Others may take several weeks to reach their summer breeding grounds and may stop over to refuel and rest in our area. Rufous hummingbird would be an example, as they typically travel to Alaska for nesting season, but may linger here briefly on their spring migration. Other birds may only be migrating as far as our local forested or riparian areas from their wintering grounds. Western Tanagers, some of the flycatchers, some warblers, would fit this category. For more than a backyard peek at many of these travelers, consider a stroll through Oxbow Nature Study Area, Rancho San Rafael Park, Galena Creek Park. The opportunity for some great sightings is practically guaranteed this time of year.
