October's High Desert Bird-of-the-Month:

House Sparrow

House Sparrows can be found just about anywhere there are people - in urban areas, suburban settings, farms and fields - except for Alaska and far northern Canada. Many people refer to them (and other small nondescript song birds) as LBJ's (little brown jobs). House Sparrows are not members of the sparrow family and

a close look will show the difference in body size and shape from White-crowned Sparrows, Song Sparrows, Spotted Towhee and others. They were brought to America and first released in Brooklyn in 1851. There were two other releases in the western United States in the 1870's, which aided the bird's spread in the West.



The males are brightly colored with gray heads, white cheeks, a black bib and rufous neck. Females are a plain buff-brown overall with gray-brown underparts. House Sparrows are chunkier with a larger head and shorter tail than other American sparrows.

House Sparrows tend to hang in very noisy flocks, although they do appear to have a pecking order. If you watch them you may notice that males with larger black bibs seem to have dominance over males with less black and over females.

Folks, it is definitely time to stock up on bird food (seed sale now through the 15th); the winter residents are starting to arrive! White-crowned Sparrows have been reported for the last two weeks, and this morning they were singing in my yard. Christie, the owner of Moana Nursery, has had a Spotted Towhee hopping around for a week or more and my "first of the season (FOS)" Spotted Towhee arrived this morning.

The Virginia creepers really put on a crop of berries this year and right on schedule, a raucous flock of about 50 starlings showed up for a week or so and ate every one of them. It was amusing to watch them hover, flutter and squawk in their attempts to grab a berry from the dangling vines. American Robins are hanging around in larger numbers right now; the pond and creek are the biggest attraction. They are also scolding other birds over the pyracantha berries and crabapples. This morning a small group of Cedar Waxwings flew in, looked over the food situation and flew off (probably to tell their buddies that there are loads of berries this year).

October Nature Happenings

* October is the best month to start watching for rare northern ducks and loons on the Front Range..

* In the past, Mourning Doves were fall migrants. But due to an ever warmer climate, increased winter cover in suburban backyards and availability of wider range of food, they are seen in communal flocks through out the winter.

* All members of the dove family favor ground feeders, seed blocks and flat trays of millet and cracked corn.

* The first storms of winter usher in winter migrants which often seek shelter in the cover of backyards.

- * Many members of the sparrow family (White-crowned, Golden Crowned, Song and Lincoln's) join the ubiquitous House Sparrow at ground feeders.
- * Sparrows can be seen scratching for fallen seeds in fading gardens.
- * Leave spent perennials standing to provide cover and much needed food for our winter visitors.
- * Orionids meteor shower is late-October.
- * This is the month to install and repair nest boxes for use next year.
- * Waterfowl migration continues to build throughout month.
- * Peak of raptor and hawk migration.
- * Nest boxes need to be cleaned out this month to prepare for winter roosting.
- * First juncos can appear late in the month.
- * Sandhill Cranes migrate.
- * Remaining hummingbirds will depart this month.
- * Beavers are very active in the evenings while caching a winter supply of food.
- * Autumn colors peak in October.
- * Brown and Brook Trout spawn.
